Things have been a little Topsy-Turvey with us lately, so we will need confirmation of attendance. Apologies if some have been omitted from the list below. Our current list is as follows:



Editor's Note: Some of you have asked me why I use the term 'Charabanc Tour' as a description of these popular events. The term 'Charabanc' is used here in an entirely complimentary and affectionate manner. Back in the days of some of our childhoods, a very popular British activity was the summer Saturday coach trip to the seaside and, where we grew up near Bristol, we used to see coach-loads of excited adults and children in those Midland Red coaches, heading for Weston Super Mare and a day of fairy floss on the beach and so on. In the 1940s and 1950s these outings were colloquially called Charabanc Tours. The Midland Red company provided these trips, at very cheap fares, for thousands of families who lived and worked in Britain's industrial heartland. They probably built some of the cars that we love so much today. Those people who chose a Charabanc Tour as a release, were not yet able to own a motor car of their own - that came later with the advent of the Morris Minor, Austin A30 and the Mini variants.

For me, memories of seeing all of those coaches motoring down the A38, the A370 and the B3130 (to Clevedon) are quite stirring. Midland Red must have had a huge fleet of buses and coaches in those days, because they also ran day tours to such places as Rhyl, Llandudno, Llanfairfechan and Penryhn Bay in north Wales which, then, must have been like an international journey!
