At that time, a late friend of mine (into Triumph Heralds) was First Mate on a Port Line refrigerated meat transport ship. He was briefly in Melbourne while loading butchered meat for the Persian Gulf, and spotted the calendar while visiting us for lunch. There is, as yet, no indication of when this action is expected to happen.

Details are in the Coming Events Notices and there is a booking form at the bottom of Page 14. This event is a members-only event and we definitely need to know numbers for catering purposes. Last years luncheon was very well supported and this year we hope to attract a few more.

The bus illustrating the coming ABCCC Coach Tour, is the transport from the railway station down to the small fishing village of Blanes, on Spain's Costa Brava. The picture was taken in June 1966 and recently dug out of the editorial filing system. The bus was a Pegaso, re-powered by a Ford tractor engine. Our coach will be more modern and will not need the steering wheel being turned metres before a bend to take up the slack! We rode on it twice.

SOME HINTS FROM THE E-MAIL 'IN' BOX

Good Vision In A Downpour

Editor's Note: This item came via the E-mail system and seems to have originated on the North American continent. Use of these warnings is always dubious, and care and consideration should be given while reading them. I would think that if such a message were genuine, then better spelling and grammar would have been employed. I do know, however, that when looking into a clear running creek, vision to the creek bottom is clearer when wearing good quality sunglasses. I also know that, when rain is falling, each drop reflects sunlight (or headlamp light) that can be a bit dazzling. This also applies to mist and fog conditions, which makes me wonder why on earth modern cars can have 'fog' lights switched on while dipped and main headlamp beams can be operated? The recommendation to use sunglasses at night should be treated with great caution. In these times when clothing fashion colours are so similar to those of the road, pedestrians may not be seen so easily in poor light.

How To Achieve a Good Vision While Driving During a Heavy Downpour.



We are not sure why it is so effective; but try this method when it rains heavily. This method was told to me by a police friend who had experienced and confirmed it. It is useful – even driving at night. Most of the motorists would turn on 'high' or 'fastest' speed of the wipers during heavy downpour, yet the visibility in front of the windshield is still bad.

In the event you face such a situation, just try your sunglasses (any model will do) and, miracle! All of a sudden, your visibility in front of your windshield is perfectly clear, as if there is no rain.

Make sure you always have a pair of sun glasses in your car, as you are not only helping yourself to drive safely with good vision, but also might save your friend's life by giving him this idea.

Try it yourself and share it with your friends! Amazing, you still see the drops on the windshield, but not the sheet of rain falling. You can see where the rain bounces off the road. It works to eliminate the 'blindness' from passing semis spraying you, too. It also works if you are following a semi or car in the rain. They ought to teach that little tip in drivers' training; it really does work.

Use Of Cruise Control (Speed Control)

This warning is a good one! I wonder how many people know about this.

A 36 year-old female had an accident several weeks ago and totalled her car. It was raining, though not excessively, when her car suddenly began to hydroplane (*aquaplane*) and literally flew through the air. She was not seriously injured, but was very stunned at the sudden occurrence! When she explained to the highway patrolman what had happened, he told her something that every driver should know – never drive in the rain with your cruise control on. She thought she was being cautious by setting the cruise control and maintaining a safe consistent speed in the rain. But the highway patrolman told her that if the cruise control is on when your car begins to hydroplane and your tires lose contact with the pavement, your car will accelerate to a higher rate of speed making you take off like an aeroplane.



She told the patrolman that was exactly what had occurred. The patrolman said this warning should be listed, on the driver's seat sun visor – never use the cruise control when the pavement is wet or icy, along with the airbag warning. We tell our teenagers to set the cruise control and drive at a safe speed – but we don't tell them to use the cruise control only when the pavement is dry. The only person the accident victim found, who knew this (besides the patrolman), was a man who had a similar accident, totalled his car and sustained severe injuries.

NOTE: Some vehicles (like the Toyota Sienna Limited XLE) will not allow you to set the cruise control when the windshield wipers are on. If you send this to 15 people and only one of them doesn't know about this, then it was all worth it. You might have saved a life.

Editor's Note: This one has been around for some time and, despite giving the subject considerable thought, I still wonder about the mechanics of speed control devices and the aquaplaning situation. Many years ago, I drove a Holden HQ model, and soon came to the conclusion that the only time it steered nicely was when the front tyres were aquaplaning! This was one of the highlights of the RACV Fly The Flag Tour and, the shed's history is just as interesting as that of the motorcars on display. Our thanks to those volunteers who made us feel so welcome.

That night we stayed in Sale and had a good Flag-off Ceremony in the closed off Bond Street. Then it was back to Maffra and west to Hevfield where it was time for morning coffee. We chose Café 3850.
